

# **Travelling Fellowship Report 2023**

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# Stop 1: Modena – October 29th 2023 - November 2nd 2023

Our fellowship journey started in Modena, Italy, under the guidance of Professor Catani and his team. The first evening was a memorable introduction for us, the fellows: Rudy and Marco from Italy, Angelo (the first Greek EKS Fellow), and Nils from Germany. United by our passion for orthopedics and eagerness for the learning ahead, we discussed not only potential



topics over dinner, we also got to know each other.



The application of the Mako Robot for tibiabased functional alignment in knee arthroplasty was a highlight in Modena. This not only provided us with a firsthand observation of the Mako robotic assisted total knee arthroplasty (TKA) and unicompartmental knee arthroplasty (UKA) but also sparked a broader understanding of alignment strategies. Our discussions delved into various alignment strategies, different from those practiced in our home institutions. Which lead to new knowledge and discussions between surgeries and over dinner.

Our experiences outside the operating room were equally impactful. Visiting the Ferrari

Museum allowed us to appreciate Modena's legacy in speed and innovation, drawing parallels to the precision we strive for in our surgical practices. The camaraderie developed through shared meals and interactions with our hosts deepened our appreciation for Italian culture and the universal language of medicine. Our heartfelt thanks go to Professor Catani and his



team for their warm hospitality and for making our stay in Modena truly memorable as we prepared for our journey to Turin.

#### Stop 2: Turin, November 2<sup>nd</sup> 2023 - November 5<sup>th</sup> 2023

The next chapter of our fellowship journey unfolded in the city of Turin, where Prof. Roberto Rossi and Federica Rosso warmly welcomed us. This leg of the trip promised a continuation of our educational odyssey, coupled with the unique charm and warmth of Turin's culture.

Upon our arrival, the camaraderie among us fellows—Rudy, Marco, Angelo, and Nils had already begun to deepen, a testament to the shared experiences and discussions that started in Modena. This was actually the weather during our stay in Belgium. We reached at the hotel at night so there was not so much time to see the city; however we found time to taste a local burger with a Belgian beer. Equally warm was our greeting by Professor Luyckx and Doctor DeGrave the next day in their meeting room. Breakfast and more were waiting for us and a small presentation took part before the

big OR program. We had the opportunity to see the first UNI cases during our fellowship and their gently surgical and anatomical approach. The cherry on the top of the cake was the next day in a cadaver laboratory in Ghent. Next morning, we visited big а cadaver laboratory and spent all the day there, in order to practice their

anatomical surgical approach, such as unicompartmental arthroplasty and more. This was really great opportunity for all of us to practice everything we had seen the day before. At the end of the day we made our presentation in different fields on knee arthroplasty, discussed around the topics and exchanged our knowledge on the world of arthroplasty. The food was great also in the lab but at the end of the day, as in every Asterix story, a great meal was waiting for us in a restaurant near our hotel. Belgium was truly rainy, but our mood was up to continue with great enthusiasm and visit our next stop.



Stop 5: Brescia, November 12<sup>th</sup> 2023 - November 15<sup>th</sup> 2023

In the late afternoon, we had an intense and stimulating scientific session where we were able to discuss all the different topics seen during the day. The dinner that followed in another typical Brescia restaurant was fantastic. The following day





After this intense day in the operating room, our co-fellow Dr Rudy Sangaletti acted as Cicerone, showing us the nocturnal meanders of the city. And after the night's efforts next morning we left for the next stop, Bern.



# Stop 6: Bern-Winterthur, November 15<sup>th</sup> 2023 - November 19<sup>th</sup> 2023

The sixth stop was in beautiful Switzerland. When we arrived in Bern at 10pm we found PD Dr. Tilman Calliess to welcome us, who immediately made us feel at ease by sharing a few beers with us. The following morning, he joined us at the hotel to guide us on a short but wonderful walk in the direction of the clinic. This is where the fun began with PD Dr. Callies showing us his way of using the MAKO for TKA and UKA cases. There was an opportunity to discuss tibial slope, rotation of the tibial plateau, patellofemoral joint, showing us all the advantages of using a CTscan based system. In the evening, we left for Winterthur, where PD Dr. Koch welcomed us with great warmth in a wonderful restaurant. After a few hours of rest, the following morning PD Dr. Koch came to



pick us up and take us to his clinic. Thus, we were able to witness several cases of TKA with the Medacta PSI system, with PD Dr. Koch who was able to best explain to us the advantages of the kinematic alignment associated with the personalized cutting system.

After the valuable experience in the operating room, PD Dr. Koch accompanied us back to the station where we took the return train to Bern so that we could have dinner with PD Dr. Callies and his colleague Dr. Carlo Theus-Steinmann who were waiting for us in an excellent typical



restaurant of the city. On Saturday morning our "surprise" awaited us.



Saturday proved to be fantastic and memorable, where after the wonderful tour of the highest peak in Europe in the morning and the succulent fondu lunch in Winterthur, the scientific session started in the afternoon. This session proved to be lively, open and stimulating and several ideas were born to improve our clinical and surgical practice.

The intense day ended with another appetizing dinner in the wonderful location before returning to the hotel, saying a warm goodbye and preparing for the seventh stage the following morning.



#### Stop 7: Lyon, November 19th 2023 - November 22nd 2023

Following the inspiring days in Switzerland, we took a train to Lyon, excited at the prospect of visiting the Lyon Knee School. Upon our arrival, we are warmly welcomed by Cécile Batailler, whose invaluable presence is marked by her kindness and profound commitment to the subject matter. On Sunday evening, we were guests at Professors' Bonnins house, where we found the other major players of the Lyon knee school gathered. Within the serene ambiance



of his house, we deliberate upon our presentations and those of the younger participants, appreciating the open dialogue and exchange of ideas that pervades the environment. On monday we continued our experience in the operating room as guests of Professor Sebastien Lustig,

who leaves an indelible mark by imparting his philosophy of alignment, fostering a dynamic research agenda encompassing a spectrum of compelling topics.

Our stay there has shown us how that the school's essence lies in its unity—a collective desire



to engage in discourse and growth, inspiring young minds to engage in science around the knee and pose questions. The second day unfolds once again within the operating theater, albeit different hospital, in а marked by а distinct philosophy and strategic approach. As guests of Prof.

Bonnin, we learned about implant planning, with an alternating approach. This alternative approach further stimulates our desire to engage in dialogue, share experiences, and contemplate future endeavors, fostering a sense of belonging within the community. Throughout our two days in Lyon, there is a palpable sense of the community's eagerness to embrace us, signaling an invitation beyond mere formalities—an invitation into the EKS environment for a future characterized by discourse and personal development, all while maintaining a steadfast commitment to surgery and patient care, guided by the contagious passion that defines Lyon's environment.

## Stop 8: Marseille, November 22<sup>nd</sup> 2023 - November 25<sup>th</sup> 2023

provide us with an opportunity to delve into and discuss a novel strategy for managing arthritis and deformities through osteotomy. We engage in discussions with the esteemed expert, Professor Matthieu Ollivier, who, in addition to organizing a saw bone workshop,

generously shares a wealth of surgical tips and tricks that are integral to his surgical and scientific endeavors.



## Stop 9: Florence, November 25<sup>th</sup> 2023 - November 29<sup>th</sup> 2023

As we wrapped up our traveling fellowship with the final stop in Florence, we are eager to share the blend of professional growth and unforgettable experiences this city offered.
